KEEPING YOU IN THE KNOW...

In 2011, Ryan Arter, a senior from Clayton Valley High School contacted D4D Founder, Mark Ruefenacht, regarding a required English Class assignment to write a paper advocating support for a local community group. Since then Ryan has been engaged with our organization as a dedicated volunteer, who has donated his website and graphic skills to D4D. Ryan has a cousin who is a Type 1 Diabetic so he is particularly interested in D4D, and helping others with diabetes through our work and mission.

In 2015, Ryan officially joined the D4D team. His first major assignment was to develop a monthly newsletter to support our work with Guide Dog Puppy Raisers, to keep them informed about the status of their dogs that have been provided to D4D for training as Medical-Alert Assistance Dogs. He is our primary editor for The Monthly Treat, and it has become a valued, informative and exciting piece of our program.



Unfortunately, late in December, Ryan learned that 2 of the 4 rods which were inserted to straighten his spine had separated from his backbone, and he needed surgery similar to that which he had in 2011. The surgery was performed January 9 at UCSF and he spent the next 2 weeks in the hospital. He is now home restarting his physical therapy. Fortunately, he is walking with the aid of a walker, using a brace for his back and shoulders. And he is no longer in any pain! Ryan now has 5 rods inserted into his back and is 3 inches taller from the latest surgery.

He is looking forward to returning to school and D4D. His positive outlook, hard work to insure his personal health and well being, as well as his dedication to working with others is a wonderful inspiration to all of us at D4D. We look forward to his return as editor of The Monthly Treat.

January is Foster Care Recruitment Month...

Our program is growing fast and we are putting plans in place to significantly grow our Foster Care Program. One thing that makes our program unique is that our dogs never spend one night in a kennel. They are at the training center during the day and in loving foster homes every night. The number of dogs we can have in our training program is directly related to how many foster homes we have available. While we are always looking for new fosters, we have made a push for recruiting new fosters in the month of January.

Dogs4Diabetics is now reaching out of our local area for Foster Care Providers. The idea is to have a group of fosters in a central area creating a “dog pool” in which the Foster Care Providers share the responsibility of transporting the dogs to the training center. The goal is to have four or more fosters in one area so that each foster would only have to drive one day a week to D4D. Our first target area for dog pooling is the Albany area. An article ran in the newspaper soliciting fosters in the Albany area.

We held two informational meetings in the first half of January, and we are happy to announce that we officially have enough fosters to start up our Albany group!

Carrie, Christina, and Mona...

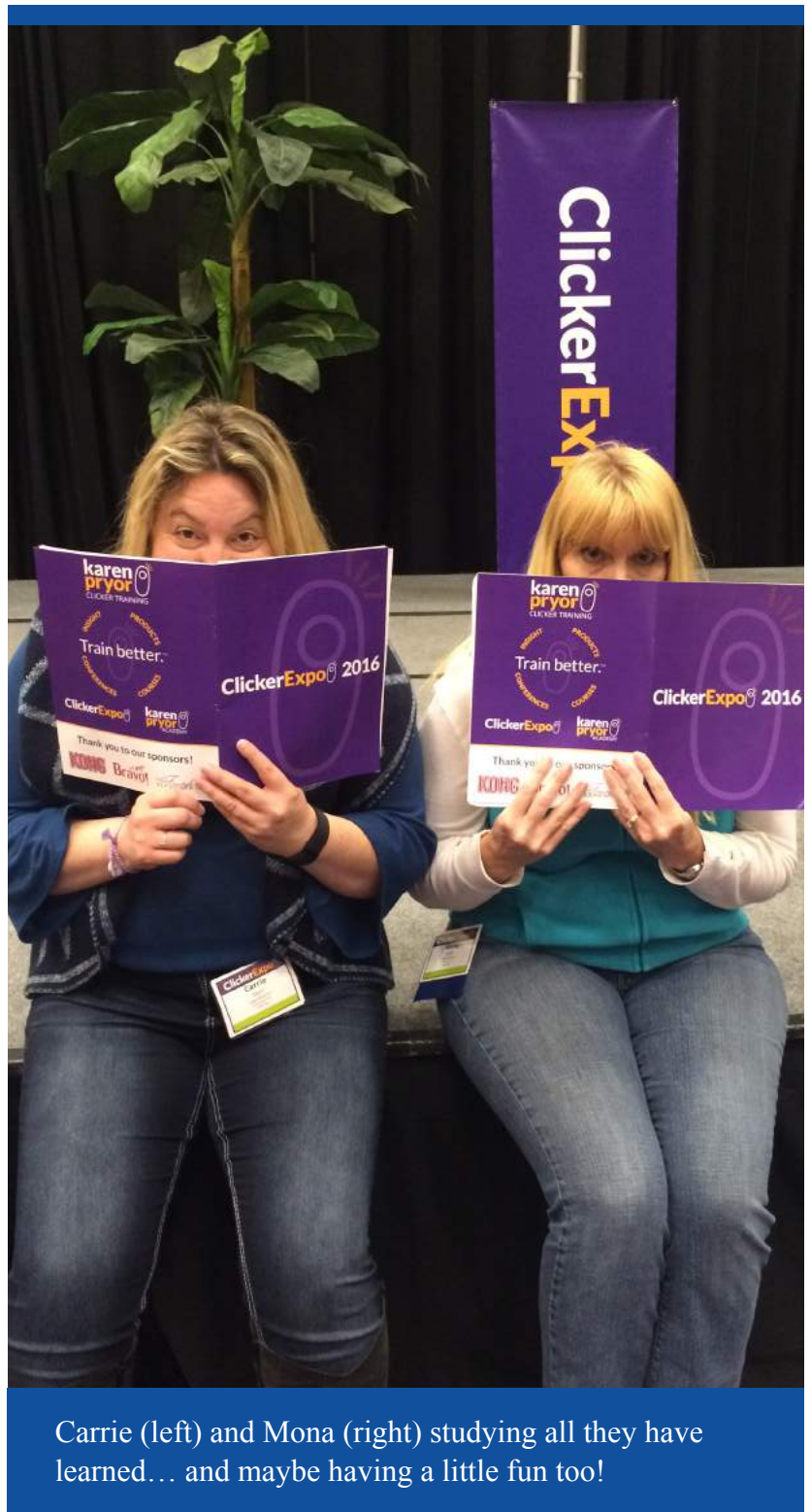
